

Watsu® Instructor Certification (revision 2023.07.26)

What is Instructor Certification? Certification is the official process by which Watsu® Practitioners become Assistants, qualified to assist Instructors, and by which Assistants become Instructors, qualified to teach Watsu® at a designated level – Basic Watsu, Watsu 1, Watsu 2, Watsu 3, and Clinical Watsu 3. The certification process ensures that Assistants and Instructors meet internationally accepted standards for professional excellence, as established by the Worldwide Aquatic Bodywork Association (WABA). Only Assistants and Instructors who are Registered (listed in the WABA Registry) are authorized to assist or teach WABA classes.

Training Programs: WABA Assistant and Instructor Training Programs throughout the world(Table 1) offer required core certification courses – Assistant Training Course (ATC) and Instructor Training Course (ITC) (Table 2). The ITC must be taught by a team. According to the number of students, classes can be composed of 2, 3 or more instructors. In classes with a small number of students (maximum of 3), solo teaching can be considered after requesting an exception from ESAC confirmed by Board.

Training Overview: Assistants and Instructors commit to follow the WABA Teaching Philosophy and Code of Ethics, and complete training requirements for a designated level (Table 3). Each certification level requires experience assisting and co-teaching, mentoring with Senior Instructors (SIs) (Table 4), and evaluation of proficiency. ITC Instructors evaluate proficiency for Basic Watsu, and Coach Advisors (CAs) evaluate proficiency for all other levels (Table 5).

Approvals: WABA Board of Directors (BD), in consultation with WABA Educational Standards Advisory Committee (ESAC), approves certifications for advanced Instructors, and for SIs and CAs (Table 6). See glossary of WABA Acronyms and terms (Table 7).

Instructor Application Package: WABA Instructor Application Guidelines, Level-Specific Application Form, and Student Evaluation Summary spreadsheet downloadable from WABA.PRO website (ESAC Docs – WABA.pro). For each level of certification, Instructor-In-Training submits a complete application package:

- a) Application Overview Form (checklist for application package and requirements)
- b) Letter of Intent (level, professional goals, description of practice)
- c) Transcripts (from WABA Registry, courses completed and taught)
- d) Written Evaluation and Recommendation from Co-Instructors
- d) Written Evaluation and Approval by Coach Advisor (CA)
- e) Professional Licenses and Insurance to meet local legal requirements
- f) Instructor in training assessment forms for all classes assisted, co-taught, taught, and coached that are provided by each ATC/ITC training program
- g) Students' assessment forms for all classes co-taught, taught, and coached

Applicants are responsible for keeping copies of their own assessment Forms throughout their training

Instructor Certification Considerations and Clarifications

- Audit/Intern Requirement: Assistants must audit and intern a class before assisting at a particular advanced class level (Watsu 2, Watsu 3, Clinical Watsu 3, Watsu 4...). ESAC may waive this requirement if Assistant is considered to be sufficiently prepared. Note that ATC prerequisites include equivalent requirement for Watsu 1 level.
- Class Size Requirement: Classes must have a minimum of four students, with at least two non-auditors.
- Requirement to Assist and Co-Teach with Different Instructors: For each level
 assisting and co-teaching must be performed with at least two different
 approved Senior Instructors.
 ESAC can agree for exception in Watsu isolated countries where only one Instructor is
 active.
- Basic Watsu Independent and Team Teaching: Watsu 1 Instructor-in-Training may combine independently taught Basic Watsu and co-teaching of Watsu 1 Transition Flow for the co-teaching requirement, but not for the CA evaluated independent teaching requirement. At least one co-teaching must be a full 50-hour course in five or six consecutive days, to ensure proficiency in teaching 50-hour intensives.
- Organizing Classes Requirement: For co-teaching and CA evaluated independent teaching, at least two required classes must be organized by the Instructor-In-Training, including all aspects of scheduling, listing, advertisement, enrollment, and arrangement to use facilities.
- Watsu 3 Requirement: Watsu 3 Instructors-In-Training are encouraged to take Clinical Watsu 3.
- **DOM and Hands-On Authorization**: Watsu 2 and 3 Instructors are authorized to approve DOM, and Watsu 3 Instructors are authorized to approve Hands-On. In special cases, WABA BD may authorize other Instructors to approve DOM or Hands-On, based on recommendation of Watsu 3 Senior Instructor, skills and supplementary training/mentoring.
- Apprenticeship Path: Training Programs to accommodate disability and special needs may be designed in an apprentice/mentor framework to meet equivalent requirements, experience, and evaluation, and must be approved ahead of time on a case-by-case basis by WABA BD based on recommendations from ESAC.
- **Core Curriculum:** WABA is establishing Core Watsu Training Curriculum to ensure that the Watsu® service mark remains a symbol of consistent professional excellence. Local ATC and ITC Programs may have additional requirements.
- Dues, Registry, Watsu® Trademark: Assistants and Instructors must pay annual Instructor Dues, as well as pay Posting Fees to register each student in every class. Registered Assistants and Instructors are listed in the WABA Registry and authorized to use the Watsu® trademark as a symbol of professional excellence.
- "Grandfathered" Certification: For each major revision of Instructor Standards, Instructors are "grandfathered in" to keep authorization to teach Watsu, as long as they teach the current form, unless otherwise approved by WABA BD. If an Instructor requires more

- training, WABA BD, in consultation with ESAC, may require completion of ITC or additional requirements.
- Continuing Education: Practitioners, Assistants, and Instructors are required take 50 hours
 of Continuing Education (CE) every three years to enhance and maintain professional skills.
 WABA maintains a list of WABA approved CE courses. Other courses may be approved by
 ESAC on a case-by-case basis.
- Agreement: Assistants and Instructors agree in writing to read, understand, share, and follow these Instructor Certification Standards and future updates as a responsibility of their WABA certification.
- **Finances:** Fees for taking classes, auditing, assisting, supervising, co-teaching, teaching, or coach advising must be agreed upon in writing by all parties ahead of time, and are typically set by the Instructor.
- Requirement Changes: In cases where Instructor Certification requirements change, applicant may follow either new requirements or older requirements (ex post facto) for up to five years from the date ATC or ITC is passed, the date certification is approved at a particular level, or the date when first co-teaching is completed for the next level of certification:
 - **Date ATC Passed:** requirements for Assistant certification and pre-requisites for ITC Class in effect on that date apply for up to five years.
 - **Date ITC Passed:** requirements for W1 Instructor certification in effect on that date apply for up to five years.
 - **Date Certified W1 Instructor:** requirements for W2 Instructor certification in effect on that date apply for up to five years.
 - **Date Certified W2 Instructor:** requirements for W3 Instructor certification in effect on that date apply for up to five years.
 - **Date Complete First Co-Teaching at next level:** requirements for next level certification in effect on that date apply for up to five years.

SI and CA Application Package: WABA Instructor Application Guidelines, SI and CA Application Forms, and Student Evaluation Summary spreadsheet downloadable from WABA.PRO website (<u>ESAC Docs – WABA.pro</u>). SI or CA candidate submits a complete application package to ESAC:

- a) Application Overview Form (list teaching and experience that meets requirements)
- b) Transcripts (from WABA Registry, courses co-taught and taught)
- c) Written Evaluation and Recommendation from Mentor
- d) Student Evaluations for each course co-taught and taught and Student Evaluation Summary

Applicants and Mentors must prepare applications using WABA Guidelines for Instructor Certification Applications, SI and CA Application Forms, and Evaluation Summary spreadsheet (downloadable from <u>ESAC Docs – WABA.pro</u>). Applicants are responsible for keeping copies of their own Evaluations, in conjunction with their TIs, Mentors, SIs, and CAs.

SI and CA Certification Considerations and Clarifications:

- Class Size Requirement: Classes must have a minimum of four students, with at least two non-auditors.
- Dues, Registry, Watsu® Trademark: SIs and CAs must consistently pay annual Instructor Dues, as well as pay Posting Fees to register each student in every class.
- "Grandfathered" Certification: For each major revision of SI or CA Standards, certification is "grandfathered in" under the rules in effect for original certification, as long as they teach the current form of Watsu, unless otherwise approved by WABA BD.
- **Professional Excellence:** with respect to logistics (scheduling, listing, advertising, registering...); diversity of venues, backgrounds, teaching styles, and cultures; objective and effective feedback/evaluation; timely communication via email, telephone, etc.; supportive and non-judgmental communication skills; prepare evaluations and review in person; coordination between TI, SI, CA, Co-Instructors, and Instructors-In-Training; impeccable ethical standards; understanding and support of WABA certification standards; timely and complete preparation of application packages.
- **Requirement Changes:** in cases where SI or CA Certification requirements change, applicant may follow either new requirements or older requirements as follows:
 - **Date Certified W3 Instructor:** requirements for SI certification in effect on that date apply for five years.
 - **Date Certified SI:** requirements for CA certification in effect on that date apply for five years.
 - **Date of Intent Request:** requirements for SI or CA certification apply for five years after a letter of intent to apply for certification is submitted to ESAC and approved by BD.
